DAY OF THE DEATH ALTAR IN HONOR OF PETE CENARRUSA

The Consulate of Mexico in Boise unveiled a *Día de Muertos* (Day of the Death) altar on Wednesday October 30th in memory of late Pete Cenarrusa, former Idaho's Secretary of State, as a way to honor him and his many accomplishments as a distinguished Idahoan and United States citizen.

Mr. Cenarrusa was elected to the House of Representatives in 1950, where he served nine terms. In 1967, the Governor of Idaho appointed him Secretary of State, position that he held for 36 years upon his retirement in January 2003.

Día de Muertos is a Mexican festivity that combines both pre-Colombian and Hispanic traditions. During August, the Aztecs paid tribute to Mictecacihuatl, the goddess of the death, while the Spanish *Conquistadores* celebrated the day of "All Saints" in November. The encounter of both cultures in early 16th Century, transformed these festivities into today's *Día de Muertos*, a celebration that has been preserved for more than 500 years and declared by UNESCO in 2003 as an intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity.

An altar is built by Mexicans to honor the beloved ones, but also public figures that passed away. Set in the altar to remember them are personal items and other handcrafted figures, such as sugar skulls, colorful paintings, *Cempasúchil* flower (marigolds) and flavorful dishes.

Screening of Los Graduados/The Graduates

The Consulate of Mexico and Idaho Public Television offered the screening of Los Graduados/The Gradutes on Octorber 9th at the Consulate's facilities. This documentary shows the obstacles that many Latino students from around the United States face in their path to a college education.

This partnership gave the opportunity to host foundations and university representatives, as well as superintendents and members of the community who are involved in education subjects, and offer an open space where to discuss the access to college education.

IME-Becas Scholarship Program 2013/2014

On October 25th, the resources of the IME-Becas Scholarship Program 2013/2014 were awarded to *Boise State University, Catholic Charities of Idaho, The College of Western Idaho yTreasure Valley Community College.* Through this Program, the Government of Mexico will support Mexican students to finish their higher education and adult education in the states of Idaho and Oregon.

The IME Scholarship Program was created in 2005 to help raise the educational levels of the Mexican population living in the United States. Since then, the Government of Mexico has yearly given 10 million pesos to non-profit social organizations or institutions that offer education, training or higher education programs that support Mexican immigrants who are interested in starting, continuing or finishing their studies.

The Consulate of Mexico in Boise fulfills the commitment of the Government of Mexico to contribute to the development and personal improvement of the Mexican community, and encourages labor certification of Mexican workers seeking to improve their education.

Human Rights: Mexico's International Agenda

Mexico positions itself once again as main promoter of migrant's human rights as it presented an allegation about child protection during the $48^{\rm th}$ period of sessions of the Inter-American Court of Human Rights.

Mexico's argument made reference to recent legislative and jurisprudential developments related to the constitutional status of human rights contained in the international treaties from which the country is part. This fact places Mexico in a leading role in subjects related to the defense and promotion of human rights.

Mexico mentioned the importance and content of minimum protection rights standards for migrant children that include due process, non-repatriation as a measure to protect children as vulnerable groups, respect family reunification, and the right of application to obtain refugee recognition. The subject of securing an effective mean of protection of those children and teenagers during their entrance, transit, residence and travel to their country of origin, was reaffirmed as a national priority.

Mexico supports and values the work of the Inter-American Court of Human Rights, both in contentious and advisory. Mexico has requested the advice of the Court in two occasions. The first in 1997 entitled "the right to information on consular assistance in the framework of due process", and in 2002 about "legal status and migrant's human rights".

THE MEXICAN SECTOR OF MEDICAL SERVICES

25 years ago, Mexico started its road to economic openness, particularly supporting international free trade and promoting direct investment. Today, Mexico has an attractive business environment, legal certainty; one of the largest free trade agreement networks in the world; well-developed economic sectors and competitive production costs.

In recent years, Mexico is ranked as the 6th exporter of instruments and devices used in the medical, surgical, dentistry, and veterinary industries.

In 2011, the medical device's industry production generated 616 billion USD and between 2011 and 2020 is expected to grow at an average annual rate of 8.1%. In the same year, the medical device's industry consumption amounted to 639 billion USD and is expected to grow to 1.3 trillion USD by 2020 at an average annual rate of 8.5%.

Mexico is currently the 11th medical device exporter in the world, the main exporter in Latin America and the leading supplier to the US. Mexico is:

- The leading exporter of wadding, gauze and bandages in Latin America.
- The third largest exporter of tubular metal and suture needles
- The fifth largest exporter of instruments and appliances used in medical, surgery and dentistry instruments.

XIII Binational Health Week

The Consulate of Mexico celebrated the XIII Binational Health Week in Fruitland, Boise, and Twin Falls, Idaho, with free cholesterol, blood pressure, and AC1 (diabetes) screening events for the community.

During the week of October 11th - 15th, free workshops were offered at the Consulate's facilities in order to keep the community updated with the latest information on preventive care subjects that have a significant impact in their lives; such as diabetes, mental health, nutrition, STD's, HIV, teen pregnancy, and the importance of vaccines.

Binational Health Week (BHW) is the largest mobilization efforts in the Americas to improve the health and well-being of the underserved Latino population living in the United States and Canada. During BHW, federal, state and local government agencies, community-based organizations and thousands of volunteers come together in October to conduct a series of health promotion and health activities education including workshops, insurance referrals, vaccinations and medical screenings.

The support of Regence, Idaho State University, St. Luke's, Idaho Lions Foundation, Center of Community and Justice, Central District Health, Corpus Christi Catholic Church, Saint Mary's Catholic Church and La Posada Ministry is greatly appreciated for the success of the XIII Binational Health Week in Idaho.



Mobile Consulate

Mexico has the biggest consular network in the world. In the United States only there are 50 consulates.

One of the many duties of the consulates is to issue Mexican passports and consular I.D. cards. In this regard, the consular network has an activity that is called "mobile consulate" in which the consulate's staff travels to different cities within their jurisdiction to bring consular services to those who work and live far away from the city in which the consulate is located.

The mobile consulate season starts on February and ends on November with one event each month.

During the month of October the Consulate of Mexico in Boise had mobile consulate in Twin Falls, Idaho. The Mexican community was able to issue passports and consular I.D.'s, as well as to receive free medical screenings and counseling in migratory subjects.

El Santo and Blue Demon Movie Series

On October 16th, the Consulate of Mexico, in partnership with the Student Diversity Center of Boise State University, began the screening of the movies of one of the most celebrated and iconic Mexican wrestlers, El Santo.

El Santo was a wrestler for nearly four decades and was seen as a symbol of justice when his character surpassed the wrestling arena and became a popular superhero.

After his many adventures were published in a weekly comic book, he rapidly gained more fame when he became a film superstar. El Santo's movies had a groundbreaking success in Mexico, Latin America, Spain and also Lebanon and Turkey. In fact, the French consider his movies as surrealism art.

Campeche

Campeche is one of the 31 states of Mexico. It is located in the eastern part of the Yucatán Peninsula.

The name "Campeche" comes from the maya word *can pech* wich means snake and tick.

This state was formed and recognized as part of Mexico in 1862 and is home to the defensive wall of San Francisco de Campeche, used to protect the city of pirates between the XVI and XVIII centuries.

Campeche has a well defined gastronomic personality. With the arrival of the Spanish conquerors, the ancient Mayan culinary art was mixed and adapted to their traditions. Later, pirates made significant

contributions with the use of new spices. One can find all types of delicious dishes joined with the hospitality of its people.
