

TEMPORARY RESIDENT (INVESTOR) (MORE THAN 180 DAYS & LESS THAT 4 YEARS)

REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Visa Application.
- 2. Valid passport and copy of the main page.
- 3. One color picture, passport size, front view, with no eyeglasses and white background.
- 4. Original and copy of the document that proves that the applicant is a foreign legal resident of the USA (I-797, I-20 advance parole, etc). This only applies for non-U.S. citizens.
- 5. Application processing fee \$54.00 USD (Cash or debit card visa or mastercard). Non refundable if not approved.
- 6. Proof of investment in Mexico:
 - a. Original and copy of public deeds or policy from a Mexican corporation signed before a Public Notary or competent public authority, stating that the applicant has shares in the capital stock of the Mexican corporation, and that the amount of the investment effectively disbursed for the foreigner's share in the corporation would exceed of \$5,576,000.00 MXN, AND,
 - b. Original and copy of public deeds that prove the ownership of personal property in favor of the foreigner's corporation being used for economic or business purposes, with a value **exceeding** \$5,576,000.00 MXN, OR,
 - c. Original and copy of the document that proves the development of economic or business activities in Mexican territory, could be: contracts, invoices, business orders or projects; licenses and permits; certificate issued by the IMSS that proves the foreigner employs at **least three employees**.

All amounts are calculated in Mexican pesos. You can consult the official exchange rate on the day of your appointment in the following website: https://www.dof.gob.mx/#gsc.tab=0

ENTERING MEXICO WITH THIS KIND OF VISA, YOU SHOULD GO TO THE NEAREST "INSTITUTO NACIONAL DE MIGRACIÓN" (INM) OFFICE TO GET YOUR RESIDENT ID.

Important:

- Requirements may change without previous notice.
- In case you are asked to support your application with supplementary documentation, you will be given a new appointment date.
- If you present a document issued from a country different than Mexico or the United States of America, it must come with an apostille or legalization as applicable; and with an official translation to Spanish.
