

Temporary Resident Student Visa

Applicable to foreigners who wish to enter Mexico under the immigration status of Temporary Resident Student.

A foreign national holding the status of Temporary Resident Student may request authorization from the National Immigration Institute to engage in remunerated activities within national territory.

Requirements:

- I. Valid Passport or id travel document under international law, in original,
- II. Original document proving legal stay, if the foreigner is not a citizen of the country where the visa is being requested, and
- III. Submit documents proving any of the following:
 - a) Studies
 - b) Under an international legal instrument for the mobility of persons

Economic solvency may be demonstrated by the applicant, by their parents, or by whoever exercises parental authority or legal guardianship, provided they are not older than twenty-five years of age, or with a letter from the educational institution certifying that the applicant has been awarded a scholarship (at least \$1,310 USD per month), or with a document from a banking or financial institution proving investments (at least \$13,585.50 USD).

NOTE: The Temporary Resident Student card that certifies legal stay and allows the holder to remain in national territory must be obtained within 30 calendar days from the date of entry into Mexico.

Fee:

For the reception, processing, and, if applicable, authorization of the visa: \$54.00 USD

Appointment Request:

Once you have gathered the necessary requirements to apply for your visa, you must schedule an appointment by emailing with your full name as it appears in your passport to: conomaha@sre.gob.mx

Appointments are personal and non-transferable.

There are no family appointments. **Each adult must make their request individually.** Minors under 18 years old may obtain their appointment scheduled by their parents or legal guardians.

Important Information: Holding a visa does not guarantee entry into national territory. It only allows the foreign national to present themselves at a port of entry to request entry into the country. Entry into Mexico is subject to approval by health and immigration authorities at ports of entry, known as immigration checkpoints, who may at any time conduct an interview regarding the purpose of the trip and verify the requirements established in the applicable legal provisions (Article 37 of the Immigration Law and Article 60 of its Regulations).
