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MEXICAN PRESENCE AT THE CANADA 150 CONFEDERATION CELEBRATIONS

As part of the celebrations of the 150th anniversary of Canadian confederation, Mexican community organizations were invited to participate in the parades that took place in the city of Toronto.

The presence in the festivities of cultural representatives of First Nations, national communities and other minority groups reflected a desire to promote the diverse and multicultural character and values of Ontario's capital.

On Saturday, June 24, at the Port Hope Memorial Park Bandshell in the Northumberland County region, a "Multicultural Day" fashion parade was organized by a group of Mexican women dressed in traditional Mexican costume.





The international event showcased the rich cultural heritages of 40 countries and attracted around 1,000 people, who enjoyed dancing, music and traditional food.

On the invitation of the Ontario government, the Puro México Folk Ballet group took part in the "Unity" multicultural parade on Saturday, July 1, on the main stage at Queens Park, along with other artistic groups from Bulgaria, Slovenia, Philippines, China, Serbia, and India. The festival featured a wide range of activities, workshops and children's games.



The dance groups Viva México Folklore and Tonatiuh Folklore represented our country in the Canada Day Parade through the main avenues of downtown Toronto, riding on traditional floats past an audience of some 2,000 people from 24 different countries.

On June 22, 2017, Ambassador Dionisio Pérez Jácome presented to His Excellency the Most Honorable David Johnston, Governor General of Canada, the Credentials that accredit him as Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Mexico to the Government of Canada.

Prior to his appointment as Ambassador of Mexico to Canada, Mr. Dionisio Pérez Jácome served as Permanent Representative of Mexico to the OECD in Paris, France.

He has held various high-level positions within the Mexican government, including Secretary of Communications and Transport (2011–2012), Undersecretary of Expenditures at the Secretariat of Finance and Public Credit (2008–2011) and Chief of Advisors of the President of Mexico (2007).

> He holds a Master's Degree in Public Policiy from the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard, as well as a Master's in International Management and a B.A. in Economics from the Mexico Autonomous Institute of Technology (ITAM).

> Pérez Jácome has been recognized for his work: highlights include the Good Neighbor Award from the US-Mexico Chamber of Commerce (2012) and the Professional Merit Award from the ITAM (2009). He has also taught courses in Public Policy, Regulation and International Trade at the ITAM, and has published articles on economics, energy and foreign policy.

MEXICANS IN TORONTO

AN INTERVIEW WITH ITZEL ÁVILA VIOLINIST AND PROFESSIONAL LUTHIER

Itzel Ávila is a violinist and professional luthier. She was born in Morelia, Mexico, where she began her training as a violinist and violin maker. She graduated in violin performance from the National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM) in 2002, already playing instruments of her own crafting.

What is the art of lutherie and what is your field of specialization?

Lutherie can be defined as the art of building string instruments. The term "luthier" comes from the French word "luth", which in turn is derived from Arabic (laud).

I specialize in violins, violas and cellos. A string instrument is at once a piece of craftsmanship and a work of art, of engineering and of alchemy. A professional instrument cannot be massproduced.

Modern lutherie follows a tradition that developed in the 18th century in Cremona. Nothing to date has managed to supersede a technology that requires no more than candlelight and the right hand tools.

Itzel, tell us about your experience as a luthier.

I discovered the amazing world of lutherie out of necessity. I was 15 years old and studying at the Conservatorio de las Rosas in Morelia (in the Mexican state of Michoacán). One day I visited the workshop of a luthier (Ricardo Pérez) and I was fascinated by this place with its wood, tools, candles, restoration workshops in Canada: Wilder and varnish, shapes, textures and colours of resins that completely (Montreal) and the Sound Post (Toronto). captivated me. SERVICES FOR FOREIGNERS

POWER OF ATTORNEY

The Consul General is empowered to act as a Mexican notary public, and is therefore able to issue powers of attorney with legal validity in Mexico. Any person or company located in Ontario or Manitoba may submit a power of attorney for the appointment of a person to act on their behalf in a lawsuit, in the administration of a business or in the purchase or sale of goods in Mexico.

ELECTRONIC TRAVEL AUTHORIZATION (ETA) FOR MEXICAN TRAVELERS

Mexican visitors who travel to Canada either to enter the country or to transit to another destination, will only need to complete an Electronic Travel Authorization (eTA).

The eTA must be applied for at least 3 days prior to travel from the following Canadian government website: http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/visit/apply-how.asp

TRAVELING TO MEXICO

Canadian nationals and permanent residents of Canada do not require a visa to enter Mexico, with the exception of Canadian citizens carrying diplomatic or official passports.
